

A POET IN HADRA: **MOHAMED IBRAHIM WARSAME**

Like all literature, Somali literature has also been shaped around the oral tradition. Oral literature and the rhetorical structures that developed within this framework have evolved and transformed over time, finding new forms under the influence of different melodies as they were passed from tongue to tongue. This, in a way, marks the evolution of literature's wandering spirit.

Neither the magical realism and fictional structure of Latin American literature nor the rhythmic and poetic voice of Turkish literature, embodied in the Orkhon Inscriptions, is independent of oral tradition. Every literature-especially poetry-has drawn from oral literature and has become the unique song of its society. This transformation resembles a traveler who, despite being born at home, sets out on a journey due to various obligations, searching for ways to reach the universal. As Ludwig Wittgenstein expressed, "The limits of our language are the limits of our world," emphasizing the quest for completeness in expression.

In this context, the transmission of oral literature from language to language and its ability to interact across cultures, integrating into different societies, can be attributed to the pursuit of universality.

One of the most famous poets of the Horn of Africa and Somalia's most renowned artist, Mohamed Ibrahim Warsame, is known by the pen name Hadrawi. Also referred to as "the Shakespeare of Somalia," Hadrawi passed away in 2022. Beyond his poetry, he was also a philosopher and intellectual who served his people as an epistemic artistthrough his philosophical writings.

In his poetry, he sought to address themes such as happiness, peace, and brotherhood within the context of divine love. Believing in the rhetorical power of poetry, he once stated: "The only weapon I carried with me was my poetry..."

Poetry is a weapon we use both in war and in peace. When we want to convey something to someone, the best way to persuade them is through poetry," said Hadrawi, emphasizing the communicative power of poetry. In his view, poetry is the emblem of brotherhood, the weapon of war, and the ultimate purpose of peace. The poet's perspective on art is, in fact, a continuation of his outlook on life, following the same trajectory.

Given that Somalia's social fabric is rooted in brotherhood and tolerance, it is no surprise that poets like Hadrawihave woven these themes and emotions into their artistic philosophy. Lastly, Hadrawi expanded his artistic and intellectual life through Somali literature, Yemen's oral tradition, and Djibouti's "Siinley Poetic Tradition." By merging poetic expression with an optimistic spirit, he became the Archimedean point of Somali poetry.

In October 2017, I embarked on the biggest adventure of my life. Thanks to the Turkish Maarif Foundation, I went to Bamako, Mali, at the heart of Africa, as a teacher. I was filled with a mix of emotions—excitement and anxiety—as I stepped into a foreign land for the first time. A different language, a different culture, unfamiliar people... Everything felt so strange! Especially the food. I encountered fruits, vegetables, and animals I had never seen before. At first, adapting was incredibly difficult.

In Mali, I taught Turkish to students from elementary to high school. Their eagerness to learn and sincerity motivated me despite all the challenges. Over time, I learned a lot from both my students and the land itself. I realized that differences are a source of richness and that life continues under all circumstances.

After six years, I moved to Somalia. Coming from Mali's hot and humid climate, Somalia's cooler, oxygen-rich air felt refreshing. Here, I encountered unique plant and animal species. Camels, in particular, seemed to be an inseparable part of the culture, present everywhere. My bond with my students formed much faster than in Mali. Many of them dreamed of studying at a university in Turkey and worked hard toward that goal. We did our best to support them on this journey.

In both Mali and Somalia, I not only taught my students Turkish but also tried to instill in them respect for different cultures, tolerance, and a more positive outlook on life. These experiences helped me grow both personally and professionally. I discovered the commonalities among people living in different geographies and cultures. Basic human needs and dreams are remarkably similar, which further strengthened my belief in human unity.



Thanks to the Turkish Maarif Foundation, I had the opportunity to meet people from all over the world. This experience has become an unforgettable memory for me. I hope to continue sharing my experiences with many more students and contribute to their future.

FOLK DANCES IN SOMALIA

Folk dances hold a vital place in Somalia's cultural heritage, reflecting the country's rich traditions, history, and social values. Rooted in oral storytelling and vibrant community rituals, Somali folk dances are more than mere forms of entertainment; they are living symbols of identity, unity, and expression. These dances are typically performed during celebrations, ceremonies, and social gatherings, such as weddings, religious festivities, and cultural festivals.

The Role of Folk Dances in Somali Society: In Somali society, dance has historically been a medium for expressing communal joy, narrating stories, and celebrating significant life events. The dances often involve a blend of poetic recitations, rhythmic clapping, and synchronized movements. Traditional Somali music, featuring drums, flutes, and other instruments, provides the backdrop for these captivating performances. Types of Somali Folk Dances:

This dance emphasizes elegance and unity, with participants forming orderly lines and executing synchronized, sweeping movements. The dance is accompanied by melodic songs that convey messages of love, hope, or gratitude.

3. Wilisaqo: The Wilisaqo dance is a traditional Somali folk dance that showcases communal celebration, unity, and cultural pride. Often performed at special occasions like weddings, community gatherings, and festivals, the dance is characterized by rhythmic clapping, synchronized movements, and vibrant attire. The participants form a circle or line, moving gracefully to the beat of drums and melodic songs that often tell stories or celebrate Somali heritage. Wilisaqo reflects the importance of music and dance in preserving Somali traditions and fostering social bonds.




Strengthening Cooperation and Communication Through Parent Meetings at Banadir and KM4 Campuses!






MAGIS EXAM IN SOMALIA



MAARIF SCHOOLS' SOMALI STUDENTS BECOME THE HOPE OF THEIR COUNTRY

Yakup Abdinor Abshir, a 12-year-old student at the Turkish Maarif Foundation (TMV) Schools in Mogadishu, the capital of Somalia, dreams of helping children in refugee camps. Abshir, who once lived in refugee camps, stated that he has been studying at Maarif Schools for six years, saying, "I couldn't receive an education in the camp, but now I can. My mother and father want me to become a businessman after I finish school."

Receiving a scholarship for his education, Abshir explained that in the camps they could only play football. He added, "When I become a businessman and earn a lot of money, I will help the children in the camps and take my parents to Hajj. I thank Maarif School because it changed my life."

Another student at the same school, 18-year-old Mohamud Ali Suri, said that he was born in Saudi Arabia and came to Somalia seven years ago. Suri, who has been studying at Maarif Schools for two years, shared: "Life was a bit challenging because my family's income was low.

My father couldn't find good jobs in Saudi Arabia. We were grateful for what we had, but the education there was weak. School fees were very high, and we couldn't afford them."

After achieving a good score in the national exam, Suri received a scholarship from Maarif Schools, saying, "This was the best thing that ever happened to me."

He explained that after his father passed away, his mother had to work to provide for the family:

"I've been studying at Maarif for two years now, and my life has completely changed since I started. Thanks to the scholarship, my mother has been able to focus on other expenses. She no longer has to struggle with paying school fees."


Suri mentioned that he has learned a bit of Turkish at school and added,

"Turkey is a country I would like to visit. I don't know much about its culture, but Turkish people are kind and honest. They are devoted to their religion and have a strong sense of belonging. I really admire that."

Abdihakim Dahir Mohamed, a 15-year-old student who has been attending Maarif Schools for two years, also shared his thoughts:

"This is the best school in Mogadishu. My father is a teacher, and my mother is a housewife. I want to be an engineer in the future. I'm getting a better education here. My teachers are very supportive and help me to become a good engineer. I'm taking better lessons now."

With two campuses in Mogadishu and one in Hargeisa, the Turkish Maarif Foundation (TMV) provides education to more than 68,000 students in 517 institutions across 55 countries.






THE BOND BUILT WITH LOVE: FAMILY
